#### **RC Honors Program growing**

Peters Program Honors at Reedley College notificareceived tion that it has been unanimously voted to be included as a member of the Honors Transfer Council of California, whose president noted that the program is "very strong and will continue to grow." This recognition would not have been possible without the hard

work of the two previous Honors coordinators, Tom Tyner and Deborah Lapp, over the past 30 years of the program's history; the dedication of the Honors faculty; and the increased support of the Reedley College administration. This membership will provide numerous opportunities for the Honors students, including the opportunity to participate in an annual Honors student research conference at UC Irvine. The Honors Transfer Council has special transfer agreements with 21 universities that give Honors students guaranteed or priority acceptance consideration, special scholarships, housing priority, pre-transfer library privileges, and a range of other academic, cultural, and social benefits. Some of these universities include UC Irvine, San Diego State University, and Mills College.

The Honors Program is also pleased to announce that over the next academic year, STEM majors will have exciting opportunities as well. Honors Forum 3C, Natural and Biological Sciences, will be offered in fall 2016, and Honors Forum 3A, Applied Sciences, will be offered in the spring 2017. Honors STEM students can choose to enroll in these Honors Forum classes, pairing them with a companion STEM course they are concurrently taking; they would do in-depth research for their companion course in their Honors Forum class. The individualized research projects the students work on for these Forum classes would



be a good start toward their ability to submit a proposal to present their research at the Honors Transfer Council yearly student research conference.

#### IT Update

We will be upgrading our network connections to the district office. This will allow faster connections to the outside world. Reedley will be getting an increase from 1gb to 10gb,



Madera from 100mb to 1gb and Oakhurst will be increased from 20mb to 100mb. The district office internet connection will be increased from 1gb to

10gb, which is an incredibly fast connection!

The pilot project to evaluate Canvas as an alternative to Blackboard is progressing on a fast past. Faculty from all colleges are participating in the evaluation will be using Canvas for their Spring 2016 classes. Based upon the results of the evaluation, they will make a recommendation on whether to either continue with Blackboard or migrate to Canvas.

The initial Canvas training was impressive and it is a very powerful and easy to system.

SCCCD is also a pilot for two other projects, Statewide Portal for students and the Online Student Education Plan initiative. The portal project will give the students easy access to all the applications in one easy to use interface. This includes email, Blackboard/Canvas, WebAdvisor and our websites.

VDI (virtual desktop infrastructure) continues to be our major technology project for this year. VDI allows the rapid deployment of software updates and hardware. It will also allow centralized monitoring so we can quickly resolve hardware/software issues.

#### ACADEMIC SENATE REPORT

As we look to the end of 2015 I would like to share two big events from the RCAS.

First after a yearlong, process the RCAS completed the revision and ratification of our Constitution and Bylaws this October. Changes included:

1) Increasing the terms of Senate Officers from one to two years
