NEWS BRIEFS

Marketing Campaign

A marketing campaign to promote the spring semester, and Extreme Registration is currently underway. The districtwide effort will help increase FTES.

A district class schedule mailer is expected to reach 273,000 homes in the district's service area.

Other marketing efforts include press releases and advertising in local newspapers. Website information, cinema advertisements, email notices, fliers and posters are also being used.

Targeted postcards will be used for Extreme Registration that will be held on January 6. In addition, there will be internal and external communication that will include social media, fliers and posters, information on computer screen monitors, Facebook, and SARS calls.

The district pushed the We Want You Back campaign in late November. A postcard was sent out to 9,982 students who enrolled in spring 2014 but did not return in the fall. Included were first-term students who completely dropped from their fall 2014 courses. As of Dec. 2, 10% of the students who received the postcard have registered for spring 2015!

Facilities Update

Reedley College is working on creating a family/unisex/ADA bathroom on campus. Originally the suggested place for this restroom was at the Art building. After discussion through President's Cabinet, it was determined that the single restroom at Building Services would be a better location. Choosing the current single restroom at Building Services would prevent the campus from having an imbalance; more male than female restrooms or vice versa. Currently, we are working on trying to ensure that the restroom is ADA compliant with any necessary hardware inside and on the door itself.

SSSP funding for Reedley College

SSSP allocations for 2014-2015 have been augmented significantly and will be used to address Core Matriculation services for first year students which include Orientation, Assessment, Counseling Advising and Follow up services for at risk students. This funding will allow Reedley College to "Scale-up" Core matriculation services which will include additional positions, activities and professional development for faculty and staff. This increase in Student Success funding from the Chancellor's Office will assist us in increasing overall college completion, transfer and student success on all campuses.

Reedley College Herdsman Housing

Furniture has been ordered for the Herdsman Housing, a home that will house students who work on the campus farm in exchange for residency. The Herdsman Housing is a new four-room residence that is located at the southern end of the campus directly east of the pavilion building. A ribbon-cutting ceremony for the Herdsman Housing will be held in January.



Four students will occupy the Reedley College Herdsman Housing unit beginning early next year.

Madera Center Career Transfer Center

The Career Transfer Center at the Madera Center is moving forward. The center was identified as a need by students on campus. It will provide testing and career center services including transfer planning. So far office cubicles are in place, ordering of furniture and technology is on-going. The counselor in that area will be Claudia Hernandez. The CTC will be ready to welcome staff and students in the early weeks of the spring semester.

Campus Security

As previously noted in the last MOR in Motion, Reedley College is wrapping up the first phase of the alarm install converting buildings that had existing alarms over to the new Verex alarm system. The new system allows for an entire building to be armed at one access point.

Buildings that have been completed are the Library Resource Center, the Art building, Portable 5, Aeronautics, the Bookstore, Cafeteria, LAL-1&2, CSS-1, DSP&S, the Forum, Forestry, Engineering & Math, Humanities, Business and AG & Natural Resources. We will soon be converting the Physical Science wing and Student Services building.

CLASSIFIED SENATE CORNER

The Reedley College Academic Senate has been very active during the winter months.

The 2nd Annual Coats 4 Kids Drive wrapped up as departments and clubs from the campus took part in providing over 100 new or used coats for children in the community! The Tutorial Center turned in the most coats and will be given a pizza party. The Classified Senate teamed up with Full Gospel Tabernacle to hand out the coats on November 22.

In addition to the Coats 4 Kids Drive, the Classified Senate is planning to adopt a family to help with the holidays for a family in need from the surrounding community.

For the Exemplary Program award we voted to nominated the Madera College Advantage Program (MCCAP) whose work to help high school seniors transition to college exemplifies the themes of this year's award "Transitions from High School to College: Assisting students in meeting their educational goals."

We also nominated English instructor Eileen Apperson for the Hayward Award. The Hayward award honors outstanding community college faculty who have a track record of excellence both in teaching and in professional activities and have demonstrated commitment to their students, profession, and college.
