# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The state of our college continues to be strong and vibrant, even during the COVID-19 pandemic. We continued to increase the number of students served last year, while greatly improving the number of students reaching their educational goals. Reedley College is one of the most recognized rural community colleges in California, offering the number one rated agricultural teaching program in the state, with one of the few two-year Natural Resources programs in the country, including our new Wildland Firefighting program. Our Flight Sciences program also has begun graduating the next generation of commercial pilots. Similarly, our Aviation Maintenance program has educated students since the 1940's and still supports the state's aviation industry while contributing to California's economy.

Reedley College will break ground this spring on its long-anticipated Center for the Fine and Performing Arts, including a state-of-the-art concert and conference venue that will improve the College's ability to share and celebrate our local cultures. A new Child Development Center will also break ground this spring, offering increased classroom capacity and learning opportunities within Early Childhood Education. Our new Math & Sciences building will open in fall 2021, providing modern classrooms and increased space for many STEM-related programs. Meanwhile, the college continues to expand the number of degrees that offer guaranteed transfer to our California State Universities and certificates that focus on industry-relevant skills, while we also update our curriculum to address new technology and the relevancy of our programs in the industry sectors we serve. The additional of new federal grant funding will allow expansion of internships and other valuable real-world experiences for our students, allowing them to convert theory to practice.

We continue to partner with both our feeder school districts and local four-year universities within the Fresno DRIVE initiative to enhance the educational attainment of our youth, especially in the areas of engineering, business and education, while we consult with our local Workforce Investment Board (WIB) to renew and update the skills of our existing workforce, contributing to economic recovery of the Central Valley region by educating our citizens for careers in growing industries that provide a living wage. As one of the 116 California Community Colleges, Reedley continues to help our community members realize both economic and social mobility, raising the quality of life for both our students and their families.



# HISTORY


Reedley College was established in May 1926, as Reedley Junior College. It was established by the Reedley Joint Union High School District, and for its first 30 years, the college shared facilities with the high school. Institutional doors were opened in September 1926 with a total of 30 students and six course offerings. In 1936 a separate building on the Reedley High School campus was built to house the junior college administration and provide additional classrooms. On July 1, 1946, the college recognized its role as a total community college.

By the late 1940s the governing board decided the time was right for the college to develop a separate campus and a separate identity. Thus, the board began negotiations to purchase the current campus site at Reed and Manning Avenues, once part of the historic Thomas Law Reed Ranch. In 1954, voters of the high school district overwhelmingly passed a bond issue to purchase the site of the historic T. L. Reed Ranch for a permanent campus. In September 1956, the college moved to this present site, where it has continued to grow and expand. It now encompasses 420 acres, including the school's 300 acre farm adjacent to the main campus.

In 1963 the college became a member of the State Center Community College District combining the resources of two of the oldest community colleges in the state. In subsequent years, Reedley College's influence expanded into several other communities including Dinuba, Easton, Fowler, Kingsburg, Parlier, Sanger and Selma, In 1980. the name was officially changed to Kings River Community College to better reflect the communities it served. The area served by the college continued to grow northward into the rural communities in the greater Fresno area. Serving communities as far-reaching as Clovis, Kerman, Madera, and Oakhurst, Kings River Community College developed three North Centers.

In accordance with the surrounding communities' wishes, the name Reedley College was restored in July 1998.

In its 93 years, Reedley College has developed into an essential component of higher education in the central San Joaquin Valley, offering over 67 areas of study taught by approximately 178 full-time faculty and 400 part-time



faculty. Since fall 2000, the combined sites under the Reedley College umbrella have provided services to over 102,000 individuals, amounting to an average of over 11,000 students per semester.






#### STUDENT ETHNICITY





2019-2020 TRANSFERS






#### STUDENT DEGREES AND CERTIFICATES 2019-2020

# KEEPING MONEY IN THEIR POCKETS

Following SB1359, beginning Fall 2017, State Center Community College created a field in WebAdvisor in which students could search for courses offered at zero textbook cost course. Reedley College, which initially included Madera Community College and the Oakhurst Center, rapidly increased zero textbook cost course (ZTC) count through faculty adoption of Open Educational Resources (OER) and other free to student resources from Fall 2017-Fall 2020. Within three years' time Reedley college increased from 3 sections designated as ZTC Fall 2017 to 71 sections in Fall 2020. Fall 2020 alone allowed 1650 RC students to take a course at Zero Textbook cost and save over \$165,000.





# EXCELLENCE IN AGRICULTURE





The Tigers defeated Foothill College 23-14 in the Northern California Football Association American Division Championship Game, capping a second consecutive 10-1 campaign to go along with back-to-back conference championships. The Tigers were led by Running Back Jamon Chambers, who rushed for 1,130 yards and 12 touchdowns, as well as 351 yards receiving and six scores in ten games. RC's defense was led by Defensive End Jay Vance, who amassed 50 tackles and 13.5 sacks.

# BUILDING FOR THE FUTURE

# McCLARTY CENTER FOR FINE AND PERFORMING ARTS

Groundbreaking scheduled for April, 2021 with anticipated completion in late Fall, 2022. The CFPA will have an auditorium with seating for 500-550 patrons, a 1,000 square-foot art gallery, indoor lobby area configurable to accommodate up to 150 people as a sit-down

dinner venue, concessions, green room, box office, conference room, restrooms and miscellaneous areas for storage and equipment. The project also includes an outdoor plaza that would function as a congregational area and may be used as an area for outdoor events and performances.

#### **HEAVY TRUCK EXPANSION**

Completed December, 2020. The \$1.8 million project was funded by the Strong Workforce Program for Career Technical Education. Two truck bays and a lab classroom area were added to the space.

#### CHILD DEVELOPMENT CENTER

The new Child Development Center will be built using Measure C and State Bond funds. The 18-thousand square foot space includes a lab and demonstration space, offices, food services, a meeting room, locker room and nurse station. Groundbreaking is expected to take place in late 2020, with completion of the project estimated for January 2023

#### MATH AND SCIENCES BUILDING

Completion scheduled for Summer, 2021. The \$20 million facility will be 20-thousand square feet, and serve as the new home to our dental and nursing programs, chemistry and bio-chemistry labs, and the math tutoring center. It is being built using Measure C Bond funds.

The ceremony was attended by immediate family only, due to COVID-19 restrictions, as well as members of the media, who conducted interviews following the ceremony. Other guest speakers

Each of the graduates received flight jackets with "Flying Tigers" patches on the left shoulder, a tradition that will continue for years to come.
