## SUPPORT FOR JUAN RODRIGUEZ AND HIS FAMILY



A districtwide effort is under way to support the family of RC Mechanized Ag Instructor Juan Rodriguez, who is suffering from Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS, or Lou Gehrig's Disease). This is a fatal condition in which the brain loses its ability to convey messages to the body's muscles. Over a period of two to five

years, a person with ALS will lose their ability to walk, talk, eat, and eventually breathe. There is no cure, and we have been told Juan will not survive the year. Juan began teaching full-time at Reedley College in 2017. He is 42 years old and is married to his high school sweetheart, Tomasita. They have two teenage boys, Benjamin and Christopher. You can help honor Juan's contributions to our community, our colleges, and our students and families by helping his family through our fundraising efforts through a gofundme account. All of the contributions will go directly to Juan's family. We are extremely thankful for all of your donations so far, which have exceeded ten-thousand dollars. Our goal is \$50,000.

## **LET THE CONSTRUCTION BEGIN**

For years, the McClarty Center for the Fine and Performing Arts was talked about a lot, created in the forms of blueprints and renderings, and had multiple fundraising efforts on its behalf. Now, all of those discussions, creations and donations are set to become reality. In front of over 100 people which included donors, supporters, community members, board members, district management and members of the RC family, the official kickoff to construction took place with a groundbreaking ceremony for the soon-to-be jewel of the campus March 2 under beautiful blue skies. "We're excited to share this

day with our Reedley College family, community members, business partners and local artists," said RC President Dr. Jerry Buckley. "This facility will create many wonderful moments for all of us, starting with this groundbreaking event. I've been excited for this day for a long time, and cannot wait to see the many performances we will be able to host here." The \$28 million dollar center will be 25-thousand square feet, complete with a five-hundred seat performance hall (which will be known as the Pete P. Peters Theatre), box office, concession stand, art gallery, greenroom and a large lobby area. Seals construction is the builder for the project, with Darden Architects as the designer. Guest speakers at the event included Harold McClarty, who donated \$1-million towards the project, Dennis Peters, the nephew of the late Pete Peters, and Robert Petithomme of Darden Architects. SCCCD Chancellor Dr. Carole Goldsmith, members of the Board of Trustees, Dr. Buckley, donors and partners took part in the ceremonial shoveling of dirt to officially mark the start of construction. Christine Keenan of our Music Department also said a few words and conducted the instrumental performances by the Reedley Community Band throughout the program. The facility is expected to be completed in June of 2023.

### **GYM FLOOR MAKEOVER**

There are now three massive projects taking place on campus simultaneously, as the gymnasium is undergoing a renovation project, literally from top to bottom. It will have a brand new floor and roof in time for the start of the fall sports season. The process started with removing the old floor in early March, all the way down to the concrete surface, as well as repairing sections of the roof "The Athletic Department is absolutely thrilled about the new gym floor project," said RC Director of Athletics Dr. David Santesteban. "This will be great for our recruiting efforts, sport competitions, physical education classes and community events. We are very thankful for the continued support of our Athletic program by our administration." Expected completion of the project is this September.

Grants, reauthorization of the Higher Education Act, Employee Educational Assistance, simplifying the FAFSA, student loan interest rates, and using pre-tax dollars to repay student loans.
