UPDATES



Construction of the Center for Fine and Performing Arts.

Welcome back everyone! Spring is shaping up to be just as busy as the fall semester was. Looking into the spring semester we will have a lot of activity happening around campus. The Center for Early Childhood and Education will be completed in late May, scheduled to open for the Fall 2023 semester. The Center for Fine and Performing Arts building is coming along. We will see the building take shape during the semester, on target for a December 2023 open. Upgrade of the Softball facility will begin in late spring and the Track replacement is in the final design stage. We anticipate it moving to DSA during the spring semester.

The Reedley Certification Center, located in what was formerly known as the LAL portable, will be open the first week of the spring semester. Free speech bulletin boards will be complete in January. The new bulletin boards will replace the one by the Student Services



building that was damaged and we are adding an additional one by the CC1 complex. Other projects we will be working on during the semester include the computer services move to the former DSPS building, window tinting of the SOC, PHY, BUS wings, and the Administration Building, carpeting MSCI 204, remodeling LRC 104, adding faculty offices to LRC 106, installation of Auto Lifts, and a campus-wide signage project. We also have the Career and Employment Center remodel, Bookstore facelift, and completion of the Greenhouse upgrade. Over the summer, the ENTIRE Reedley College Campus will be painted. SOC, HUM, PHY, and BUS wings will be getting new roofs and the HVAC in SOC will be replaced. The boilers in HUM and the Women's PE Locker room will also be replaced this summer.

The Facility & Safety Committee will be identifying the next set of projects for the campus to focus on, reviewing and recommending construction related special funding requests, assist pathways to help refine pathway hubs, and work with the equity committee to begin establishing affinity spaces around campus.

The Budget Management Committee has been busy reviewing special onetime funding requests. Next, they will advance recommendations on the special onetime funding to college council. In case you are wondering, the special funding opportunity arose in the fall after instructional equipment monies and some onetime funding from the district was received, after the final budgets had been submitted. Reedley received \$1.176 million in instructional equipment funding and \$442K

in onetime funding. These had special criteria to meet: funds could only be spent on equipment and construction. During the spring semester, the Budget Committee will be looking at program review requests for the 2023-2024 fiscal year and making funding recommendations to college council.

With the help of an outside consultant, DBRAAC (District Budget and Resource Allocation Advisory Committee, is working on a new allocation model for the district. Rebecca Snyder and Melanie Highfill are representing Reedley College on the DBRAAC taskforce which is concentrating their efforts on looking at a model that will incentivize the college to grow and focus on student success. The proposed model would fund the colleges based on the current Student-Centered Funding Formula (SCFF) which is how district is currently funded. As we get closer to a final product, we will begin presenting it to the campus community for comments and recommendations.

The Reedley College Business Office is hard at work with the implementation of Marketplace. Marketplace will allow programs on campus to create websites to sell products. We are currently in the testing phase of this project and are working diligently with Kings River Review to iron out all the kinks. Once we have things smoothed out we will provide more information to the campus on how it will work and how programs can sell products online. The Business Office is also busy working on the implementation of One-Card. One-Card will allow students to have a digital student body card offering broader use of them.

Building Services worked on floor projects over the winter break and will remain busy with all of the events happening during the spring semester, culminating with commencement in May.

Reedley College Café will be expanding services to the north side of campus with the Tiger Café mobile cart. They will also be in full swing with all of the catering for the many events on campus during the spring semester, also culminating with graduation.

We in Administrative Services hope you all have a great Spring Semester and we look forward to seeing all the hard work you do payoff at graduation!

UPDATES

Up to our holiday break, our enrollment for spring 2023 was running well ahead of our enrollment for the same period last spring. Thanks to all who've been involved in outreach to students, worked with them to ensure their successful enrollment and struggled for months to find the right mix of classes, times and locations to optimize our enrollment. More updates to come, but we appear to be on track to meet or be very close to our ambitious goal of 6.75% enrollment growth for the 2022-2023 academic year.

On the accreditation front, based on strong advocacy from Reedley, the District has decided to utilize ACCJC's new accreditation standards. The new standards have much the same focus as those previously used, but reduce the number of standards from more than 100 to about 40, provide more clarity, reduce repetition and overlap and generally simplify the process. We are fortunate that Onesta Francis, FT Kinesiology faculty and Women's Soccer Coach, has agreed to step in as the Accreditation Faculty Liaison. If he hasn't already, Onesta may be reaching out to you soon to begin work on our Institutional Self-Evaluation Report (or ISER). The Planning Committee is working alongside Onesta to create a system for evidence identification and storage and help with the hard work of writing an ISER that represents all of the excellent processes and practices already deployed at Reedley and addressing any shortcomings we might have in time to make corrections or improvements.

Several distinguished retiring faculty will leave us by the end of May, so we are working hard on the formal process for hiring their replacements. Look for your opportunity to serve on a hiring committee and help shape the future of the college. Instructional deans are looking forward to becoming more directly involved in Pathway Success Teams; you'll hear more about that message later on Opening Day. One of their roles is to help put into motion your pathway's vision for your hub — yes there are certain elements that students need to be able to access at every hub, but the way those elements are provided may depend on your hub space/facilities and the way your pathway already engages with students.

The VPI, Deans and academic support staff are looking forward to a great spring.



Starfish

Starfish To Do Items at Reedley College: 26% of students assigned the RC Register for Next Semester To Do have registered for Spring 23! (as of 12/16/22). In November 2022 we went live with the first Reedley College To Do item in Starfish. RC Register for Next Semester is being used as part of our enrollment retention efforts. This item is visible by people in student services, support programs and instruction to collaborate on outreach efforts. The item was raised for 4,360 students who had not registered after their Spring 23 registration date had passed. This item is helping us gather information about our student's intentions for the next semester.



 Degree Planner Highlight: Students can access their Counselor-approved Student Education Plan (SEP) in Starfish! Students can interact with their plan and will be alerted when changes being made require a Counseling visit. Let's hear it for empowering our students to being better involved with their SEP!



 Early Alert Highlights: For Starfish Early Alert, we set a new high for progress survey completion rate during Fall 22. We have also expanded on the early alert data that is available to you both at the college and pathway level through each pathway's sharepoint site.

NextUp

The NextUp component of the EOPS programs has received new guidance regarding recent changes to NextUp foster youth eligibility criteria. These changes include lowering the minimum age in care from 16 to 13, eliminating the requirement that students be enrolled in nine units, and allowing services to continue after students turn age 26. The guidance also clarifies that all current and former foster youth who meet the "statutory" NextUp eligibility criteria are eligible to be enrolled in the NextUp program and "shall not be required to meet any additional EOPS eligibility requirements as a condition for enrollment. As such, the minimum of nine units is no longer required, but rather only need to have a student education plan (SEP) designed to move the student towards subsequent enrollment in at least nine units or more. These are welcome changes for the NextUp program as this will help increase the number of eligible foster youth students attending Reedley College.



Developing Hispanic Serving Institution

Reedley College Developing Hispanic Serving Institution (DHSI) grants Title V 2019 & 2020 joined forces to establish the Office of Hispanic Serving Institution (HSI) Initiatives. Since its establishment, the office has been successful in supporting and launching new programs and initiatives.

- Pathful Connect, formerly known as Nepris, is a platform that brings the real-world into the classroom. Career chats have been held weekly throughout the semester in the Career Center providing students with the opportunity to chat virtually with industry professionals from around the world giving students a global perspective!
- The 1st ever Experience Fair- Service Learning, Applied Learning, and Work-Based Learning showcase was held in September. There were 362 attendees, 23 organizations, and seven on-campus resources. Students were also able to chat virtually with CBS TV Director Mark Grant regarding his college to career experience via the Pathful Connect platform!
- Office of HSI Initiatives, Dual Enrollment, Equity, and Ensenamos en el valle Central represented Reedley College at the 36th annual Hispanic Association of Colleges & Universities (HACU) conference held in San Diego, CA.
- 300+ professional headshots have been taken of over 150 faculty, staff, and students throughout the Fall 2022 semester.



Student Activities

- The Clyde Cares Committee awarded 40 RC students experiencing hardships a \$50 Save Mart grocery gift card.
 Thank you to all you donated to make that possible!
- There were eight new campus clubs started by students this year, bringing our total to 33 active clubs! We are excited to see students wanting to get involved on campus.
- Thanks to the collaboration with the newly formed Asian Pacific Islander Faculty & Staff Association (APIFSA), the Student Activities Department has been able to help host more cultural events than in recent years.
- The Clyde Cares program received a generous donation of \$500, initially meant to be used to reward the person that found FDR, Jim Mulligan's cat, which had been missing for 36 days. The person who found him turned down the reward and asked that it be donated to a good cause instead. We are grateful for this donation and cannot wait to use these funds to help more RC students in 2023!



Admissions and Records

The purchase of a Transfer Evaluation System (TES) helped us to more efficiently evaluate external transcripts, working with David Shoemaker, Ruby Duran, and Ellyce Parento-Garcia.on Articulation Binder. Evaluations Specialist Donna Hunt participated in Partners in Community. In Fall 2022, we received and processed 759 graduation applications, and so far for spring we've received and processed 340 graduation applications, with more coming in every week.

Students can now explore our Reedley College (RC) Pathways through our online Pathways Program Mapper. Each Pathway has a list of programs, program information and career exploration information. Students can get help on registration and program information.

Residence Hall Events

New Grant Award to Benefit RC STEM

Reedley College was awarded a Developing Hispanic-Serving Institutions Title V grant for the FY 2022 grant competition from the U.S. Department of Education. The United in Diversifying Our Students (UNIDOS) in STEM project will seek to increase the number of first generation Hispanic and low-income students who enroll, complete, and transfer in STEM degree pathways. Funding will support STEM outreach, wrap-around case management, improved lab spaces and equipment, curriculum development, and a Mathematics, Engineering, Science Achievement (MESA) program which will further support underrepresented students to excel in STEM fields. "I would like to thank all the faculty and staff that made this grant award possible by their hard work in serving our students and ensuring that students who want to pursue a STEM career have the best support to reach their dreams and goals," said RC Dean of Instruction Juan Bedolla. The total funding of three-million dollars for this award will be received over five years (\$600-thousand/ vear).

RC to Receive part of \$65.1m Grant

President Biden announced the Fresno-Merced Future of Food Innovation (F3) Coalition as one of 21 winners of the \$1 billion Build Back Better Regional Challenge, the most impactful regional economic development competition in decades. Funded by President Biden's American Rescue Plan and administered by the U.S. Department of Commerce's Economic Development Administration (EDA), the Regional Challenge is awarding approximately \$65.1 million in grants to the Fresno-Merced Future of Food Innovation (F3) Coalition, led by the Central Valley Community Foundation, to drive agriculture innovation in California's Central Valley. RC is one of eight community colleges across the five-county region that will be involved in providing job skills training and certification for farm workers and food industry workers through what is called the AgTEC Workforce Initiative, led by Merced College. The training will be geared toward lowskill, low-wage workers whose jobs are most likely to be displaced by automation, helping them gain the knowledge and skills they need for more advanced jobs in agriculture or food-related manufacturing. The coalition aims to integrate technology into the agriculture industry to improve productivity and job quality for farmworkers, while also driving a more resilient and sustainable food system.



Scholarship Surprise

Darla Castillo had no idea that Christmas was coming early for her in class Tuesday morning (October 18), as she was named the recipient of the Ohana Aviation Maintenance Technician (AMT) Scholarship. Darla was presented with a check for \$5,000 from State Center Community College Foundation Executive Director Rico Guerrero with her fellow students on hand to congratulate her. The AMT scholarship was established by a group of employees from a corporate flight department in San Francisco to help those with a financial need to attain the training and certification needed to succeed in an aviation career. She will be sponsored throughout her stay in the AMT program if she maintains a 3.0 grade point average, and could also receive an additional scholarship. Darla is majoring in Aviation Maintenance Technology and is obtaining her Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Airframe and Powerplant certificates through the program as well. "This is a program I enjoy and an industry I love, and to continue that dream of being an aviator, a mechanic, to explore the world of aviation, this is a big part of it, so I cannot thank everyone enough," she said. Darla's parents have always told her that anything is possible, and with the recent passing of her mother, she wishes she could share this special moment with her. "She would be so proud." Castillo is interested in pursuing a career in accident investigation, and thanks Reedley College for the opportunity to make her dreams come true. "I'm very surprised (to receive this). This is my passion. The sky's the limit."

RC Awarded EOC Program

Reedley College was awarded an Educational Opportunity Center program which will provide counseling and information on college admissions to 850 qualified adults who want to enter or continue a program of postsecondary education. This program will also provide services to improve the financial and economic literacy of participants. An important objective of the program is to counsel participants on financial aid options, including basic financial planning skills, and to assist in the application process. The goal of the EOC program is to increase the number of adult participants who enroll in postsecondary education institutions.

All Systems Go

The Reedley College Business/Information Systems department inaugurated their new Information Systems Lab Tuesday, August 16th. Information Systems Instructor Jason Boyer opened the doors to the new Information Systems Lab at 12:00 pm, with excited students arriving for class, ready to learn. The lab moved from its previous location under the bleachers of Reedley College's gym this summer to its new home in the Humanities building. In addition to the renovation efforts put in by Reedley College's classified staff. the vast majority of the instructional technology equipment installation and configuration was completed by student workers from the college's Information Technology Services Department. These students recently completed the major requirements for the Information Technology Support and Cisco CCNA Networking programs at Reedley College and directly used the skills they learned to support the program from which they graduated.
